The first item I would like to propose is a name change for our AAPS publication. The Newsletter has outgrown its name. Webster's New Collegiate Dictionary's definition of newsletter is "a printed sheet, pamphlet, or small newspaper containing news or information of interest chiefly to a special group" which implies smallness which the newsletter is not. I have some ideas for a new title, but I would like to receive suggestions from the membership. The new name will be published in the next Newsletter and if there are no major objections, the change will become effective with the following issue.

In future issues, I will reserve one page as an Editor's page that will be used to publish letters and Editorial responses/comments. If you have any suggestions, complaints, and/or comments, please let me know. The major portion of upcoming newsletters will hopefully consist of an article by a regular or student member. The topic and format of the manuscript can be scientific, tutorial, philosophical or anything the member would like to have published. At present, its length is open ended and the publication date will be determined by how well the manuscript "fits in" with the rest of a particular issue. However, the manuscript will be published as soon as possible. Therefore, please start submitting your manuscripts. In addition to the featured article, I would like any responses to previously published articles. For example, in the last Newsletter, Harry Hollien published "Some Perspectives for the Phonetic Sciences." Do you have any comments, questions, or disagreements with his ideas? Jot them down and let AAPS know.

I would like to expand the listing of meetings to include any seminars, workshops, or other activities that you and/or your organization may be sponsoring. Also, if you come across any news items that would be of interest to the rest of us, cut it out and send it to me. I'll make arrangements to reprint it in the Newsletter.

On a personal note, if there are any personal changes that you would like to share with AAPS, please submit them for publication. These can include, but are not limited to, job changes, promotions or awards. I would also like to list the graduation of any student members in the following format: student's name, degree, university, thesis or dissertation title, advisor's name. This information may be submitted by either the student or the advisor. Students, if you are in the market for a job, send me a description (about one paragraph) of the type of job you are interested in and it will be published in the Newsletter. Employers, if you have an opening available, please submit the job description and requirements. In this way, we can maintain a job wanted/available column.

Finally, I would like to start running advertisements in the Newsletter. This would allow advertisers to disseminate information about their products or services and provide a small income to the newsletter.

PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

I am pleased to have been elected President of AAPS and will make every effort to "measure-up" to my distinguished predecessors in this position. I feel that we have a number of items of business to attend to in the next two years, including a need to (re) define the conceptual framework of "Phonetics" as we use it in this country. Each of us are aware of the significant role phonetics play in our educational programs, but occasionally we have difficulty expressing the need for phonetics education to fiduciary decision-makers. Perhaps as an organization we can take the lead in signifying the value of knowledge of experimental phonetics (beyond introductory coursework) to our university and laboratory administrators. This idea, of course, takes on significant proportions when we consider the public and private funding for phonetic research may hinge upon a clear understanding of the field of study. Needless to say, I have no illusions that we can all reach total agreement on such definitions, nor do I have a particular interest in developing rigid frameworks of "certifications" with all the trappings associated therewith. Rather, I believe that the AAPS membership represents some of the best minds in the study of Phonetics today, and thus accords the AAPS a unique position in contributing to the growth and development of the field.

It is time, perhaps, to re-evaluate our organizational goals and purposes, to reaffirm those we deem worthy of reaffirmation, and to pursue those goals and purposes with a renewed vigor. To wit, where are we after 10 years, and what should we be looking to accomplish over the next decade? While attempting to deal with those philosophically murky questions, we perhaps should renew our efforts to inform our colleagues about our research and educational activities through our newsletter, and for those in higher education, to encourage our students to become a part of the AAPS. In addition, the newsletter might serve as an educational medium for discussion of some of the controversial issues in the study of phonetics.

In summary, I am proud to have been a part of the AAPS as it has grown over the past several years, and I look forward to hearing from and working with each of you as your President over the next two years.

In addition to simply increasing our number, an increase in membership enhances the opportunity for communication between professional people who have interests in the Phonetic Sciences. Therefore, I would like to encourage each of you to make a special effort to recruit at least one new member for AAPS during 1984. In particular, I would like to request that each of you associated with educational programs make a concerted effort to recruit student members for AAPS. AAPS is only as viable as its members, and in order to satisfy the several goals and objectives of AAPS it is imperative that we provide the opportunity for persons interested in the Phonetic Sciences to join our growing and active organization. In order to assist you in this task, there is an announcement about AAPS on the last page of the Newsletter which I hope you will post. (Notice that the announcement has an application form at the bottom which can be used for potential candidates to apply for membership or student membership).

Moreover, although AAPS is still a relatively small organization it is no less important in its mission as are larger organizations such as ASHA and ASA. Consequently, there is much work to be done each year. Many AAPS members have and presently are serving on various committees that are active within the association. For example, AAPS holds an annual meeting which takes much planning mostly done by the Professional Meeting Committee. The AAPS Constitution and By-Laws are continually needing revision as our association grows and our needs change - the Constitution Committee must deal with these changes. Indeed one of the biggest jobs in the association is publication of our bi-annual Newsletter. The Editor-in-Chief is always looking for members to serve as Association Editor or contribute items of interest to the Newsletter.

If AAPS is to continue to grow and be useful to its members as the voice of Phonetics in the USA, then we must work together to fulfill the goals we set out to realize twelve years ago. The "bottom line" is that AAPS needs new members and volunteers to work on various committees and/or contribute their ideas for improving the Association. MINUTES

1983 AAPS ANNUAL BUSINESS MEETING
Cincinnati, Ohio, November 19, 1983

The meeting was called to order by George Allen at 7:33 P.M. He reported that the AAPS meeting planned for San Diego (with ASA) earlier in the month was cancelled due to a low attendance of AAPS members planning to be in San Diego. The meeting was to be of a round-table, forum type, entitled, "AAPS -- It's Past, Present and Future". However, because of the interest this topic created by those members who could not attend the ASA meeting, such a meeting will be held some time in the future.

The next item of old business was the reading of the Executive Secretary's report submitted by W.S. Brown, Jr., who could not attend the meeting. The main points of his report were as follows:

I am happy to report that the AAPS treasury is well into the black. By the end of the year, 1983, we should have over \$800 in the treasury which will more than meet our expenses until the 1984 dues begin to come in around March and April. As usual, a detailed report of the treasury for 1983 will be printed in the next AAPS Newsletter.

On a lesser note, attempts by our outgoing President, June Shoup, to organize a separate AAPS meeting in 1983, were unsuccessful. As a result of a questionnaire sent out late in 1982, the inability to attract interest in a separate meeting, and the apparent state of the economy, for the next few years at least, future AAPS meetings will probably take place in association with other allied professional organizations such as ASA, ASHA, the Linguistic Society of America, and the like. These meetings will be planned in advance and contain information relevant to the Phonetician and interested parties. If you have ideas for an upcoming meeting, please contact the Executive Secretary in care of the AAPS post office box.

The past two years have found the activities of AAPS in an apparent "lull". Some of this was due in part to an unimaginative Newsletter, some as a result of a year without a formal scientific meeting, and some due to a falling off of the AAPS membership. The future of AAPS, and certainly its future growth, will require a rekindling of interest in fostering phonetics in America. This will have to come from the membership. I am asking all of you in attendance, as I will in the form of an appeal to all members in the next AAPS Newsletter, for your help. I am asking you to write to the President or Executive Secretary with your thoughts and suggestions, to send materials of interest to the editor for inclusion in the Newsletter, to attend and participate in future AAPS business and scientific meetings, and to offer your services in any way that you may be asked to in the future. Also, I am asking each of you to tell your colleagues and students, especially at your home institutions, about AAPS and to apply for membership.

Next, George Allen read the Editor's report which was as follows:

The new Editor of the AAPS Newsletter is Dr. James W. Hicks. Presently, the Newsletter is our most visible means of communication the activities of our Association. However, in order for the Newsletter to be viable, it must have input from the membership. Dr. Hicks is encouraging each member to send any newsworthy items, letters to the Editor, reports of research activities, announcements or anything that they feel may be noted for inclusion in the Newsletter, to him at any time and as often as possible. Also, any member who wishes to work on the editorial staff is invited to contact Dr. Hicks in the near future. Send all inquiries, materials for inclusion in the Newsletter, or general comments and suggestions to Dr. Hicks in care of the AAPS post office box.

Final old business was the report from the Nominating Committee, consisting of Charles Speaks, Chairman, Robert Coleman and Ingo Titze. Results of 1983 election of officers were:

Of 38 ballots returned:

For President, Daniel Beasley	38 votes
For Vice President, Thomas Gay	37 votes
For Councillor, Donald Sharf	38 votes
For Nominating Committee, Ray Colton	37 votes

As no further old business was initiated from the floor, George Allen turned the meeting over to the incoming President, Daniel Beasley, for discussion of new business. In his opening remarks, President Beasley thanked the members for their faith in his abilities to provide leadership as President of AAPS. He indicated that AAPS should be a source of commentary on the resurgence of basic sciences in higher education programs around the USA. He also indicated that additional comments will be published in his presidential address to appear in the next AAPS Newsletter.

President Beasley urged all members to contribute to the AAPS Newsletter. He pointed out that members should send any newsworthy item to the Editor, James Hick as soon and as often as possible.

The next order of business was the place and format of the 1984 AAPS business and scientific meeting. President Beasley passed on the recommendations of the Executive Secretary that the meeting be held in the Fall of 1984, and that it be associated with ASHA, ASA, the Linguistic Society or the like. Suggestions were then opened to the floor.

John Black stated that it was not so important to have a separate meeting per se, but that it was important that AAPS sponsor sessions related to the Phonetic Sciences at various organizations. He mentioned that he recently attended the Speech Communication Association meeting and ASHA convention, and whereas they use to have a strong phonetic input, this was no longer the case.

Francis Freeman suggested that ideas be forwarded to David Kuhn of ASHA regarding our input to the speech science section -- maybe a session as such sponsored by AAPS.

Several members in attendance (Carol Wilder, Elaine Fenton and Ray Colton) agreed that we should sponsor a forum or mini-seminar to be submitted to the ASHA program committee. John Black added that AAPS should submit ideas to whatever organization is most receptive to our input -- Francis Freeman reinforced that we should focus on organizations where the need is greatest.

President Beasley indicated that he would follow-up on trying to appoint a liaison representative to the ASHA Scientific Committee.

Further discussion ensued concerning possible topics for a mini-seminar. George Allen commented that research presentations belong in the regular format of ASHA or ASA and other groups, and that AAPS should provide educational or therapeutic courses. Other topics suggested were a seminar on instrumentation techniques and teaching of Phonetics.

President Beasley asked for volunteers from those in attendance to spearhead a committee to formulate topics for a seminar along the lines of instrumentation or teaching in Phonetics, and to determine when and where it could be held and with what organization. He indicated that such a charge would be turned over to the AAPS Professional Meetings Committee for further action/planning.

President Beasley then asked for suggestions from the floor regarding ideas for the AAPS Newsletter. Francis Freeman suggested a section on teaching materials. Ray Colton added the suggestion of a section on computer software for various computer systems.

President Beasley announced that the business meeting would continue informally during the social hour to follow immediately featuring an open bar. He indicated that this was a good time for members to get acquainted and that the social hour would be a yearly feature in association with the AAPS business meeting.

The business meeting was adjourned at 8:06 PM.
